

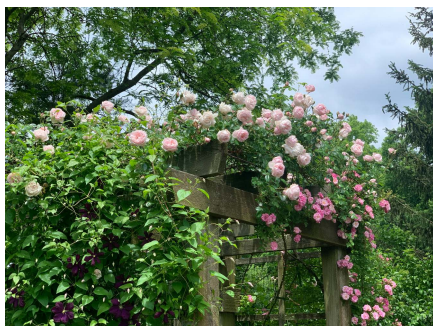


From the Director

A Splendid Weekend in Shreveport: June 3-6, 2021

The American Rose Society hosted the Board of Directors and guests at the American Rose Center, Shreveport, LA. It was a fun-filled weekend. Congratulations to Jon Corkern, Executive Director, and staff, who worked exceedingly hard to make it a perfect event. It was my first big event and travel since Covid struck in March 2019. Getting together with people and being together was incredibly special.

Friday was an evening of "Wine and Roses." The celebration honored Robert Martin, President of the American Rose Society and 2021 recipient of the Mary Johnston Award.

Since 1977, when Shreveport resident Mary Johnston was recognized for her

significant role in the rose being named America's National Floral Emblem, the American rose Center has honored others who have made important contributions to the Gardens with the Mary Johnston Award. Bob is the first person to receive this award outside of Shreveport's residence. The award was given concerning his work and support of the Great Garden Restoration Project.

Congratulations! Claude is a Master Rosarian, curator, educator, lifelong supporter of the American Rose Center, and creator of the new ARS Secret Garden. Thank you, Claude, for all you do!!!

Saturday ARS Board Meeting. There were no "hot" controversial issues at this meeting. Much of the discussion evolved around the financial report. Incidentally, the financials are quite good for 2020, despite COVID. The

2020 budget predicted \$69,000. deficit. However, donations are up, and the Payroll Protection Plan (Federal Government Support to small businesses during COVID) helped the society maintain a "black status."

Secondly, the board discussed the progress and financials of the Great Garden Restoration. The first circle is complete and planted. The second circle is funded, and the hardscape construction has begun. The fourth circle has a promised sponsor and will be paid in full when the third circle fundraising is complete. We are almost there! If you would like to support America's Rose Garden development, see the attached form for opportunities to donate.

Staff turn-over. Unfortunately, Lucy Medvec, Membership Chair, has resigned. She is starting a new position with the Catholic Church. Teresa Castello, Accounting, has also resigned, accepting employment with the Federal Government, which offers lucrative retirement benefits. Both ladies are an enormous loss to the American Rose Center! We will miss them but wish them both success

and happiness in their future endeavors.

flushes throughout the season, with long pointed buds. 2-3 feet height. 'Niphetos' means "Falling Snow" in Greek.

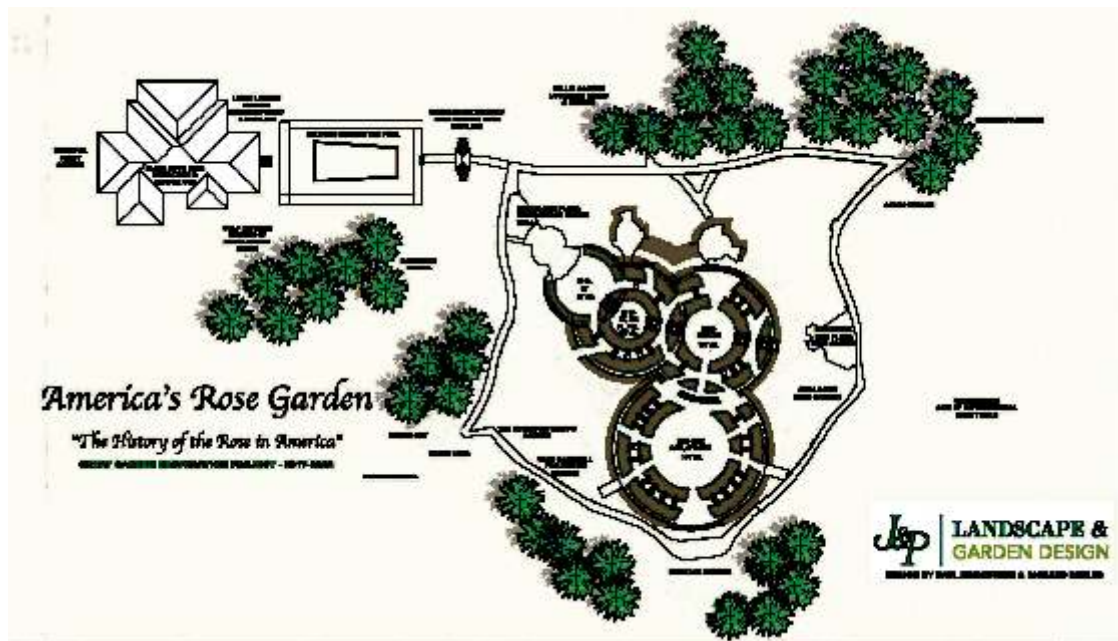

Great Garden Restoration Project - 2017-2022

The gardens of the American Rose Center, now known as *America's Rose Garden* was created in 1972. The American Rose Center is the national headquarters of the American Rose Society, and the nation's largest park dedicated to roses. It is an educational resource, a nature retreat, an event venue, and a showcase for the Rose, America's National Floral Emblem. At the planned completion date of our project, we will celebrate the garden's 50th year! Let's look forward to that celebration together!

In 2016, after 44 years of ever-encroaching pines, root intrusion, soil depletion, reduced sunlight and deer invasion, the Gardens at the American Rose Center were tired, old and suffering. Realizing the value of the gardens to the mission of the society, and our need to fulfill the promise of the gardens made so many years before, the American Rose Center Committee and the ARC Task Force for Restoration—all volunteers—took on the responsibility for the state of the gardens.

A five-year Master Plan was created, and the GREAT GARDEN RESTORATION PROJECT 2017-2022 was launched. The plan called for the consolidation of many of the scattered gardens into one impactful and singularly beautiful core garden. The new gardens will be unique in that they will tell the

History of the Rose in America featuring the stories that shaped the incredible history of the Rose.

The new gardens are made up of four large circles, at varying ground levels, that are reminiscent of the gears of a vintage timepiece. As one steps into the first circle, he will be surrounded by the most striking and colorful modern roses. From there, each circle will take him back in time, to discover the rich history of the world's favorite flower, until finally, he emerges to find himself in the area of the earliest roses of all—the species roses that were found in the wilds of China centuries ago.

The Master Plan, in its immediate and long-term goals, provides for new revenue sources; educational elements and activities; outreach to other groups; new and interesting plantings that will enhance and provide backgrounds for the garden's roses; proper signage that will provide education, recognition for donors and direction; and a registry of all botanical species in the gardens.

It's exciting! We have momentum, having already raised \$570,000 in cash, services and pledges, which has almost eliminated our list of immediate goals! Now, we must raise \$800,000 for the installation, bringing us to a project total of \$1.4 million. We invite you to be a part of this historic restoration, which promises to be a very valuable asset for the Shreveport and Northwest Louisiana Communities.

Cream City Roses

This article is a synopsis of an interview with Bruce and Maggie Barr, Convention Co-Chairs for the ARS National Conference and Rose Show, Milwaukee, WI, September 10-14, 2021. The complete interview is available on Rosechat Podcast. Teresa Byington conducted the Interview on June 8, 2021.

As the pandemic resolves, we are ready to celebrate roses in Wisconsin!

Education

Education has been a primary concern in developing this convention. Several years ago, Lew Shupe, Klima Award Winner, Ohio, dreamed of having an ARS National Convention with all Klima Award Winners as speakers. Andy Plasz, speaker chair, wanted to fulfill Lew's dream. The American Rose Society presents the Klima Award to individuals who have made outstanding achievements in rose education.

Speakers and Programs

Dr. Tommy Cairns- Golden Ages of Roses

Marily Williams- Botany 101

Jeff Wycoff- Rose Shows in Perspective

Bob Martin- Horizon Roses 2021

Baldeo Villegas will be leading the pest panel.

- ! Raymond Cloyd joining us from Kansas State University, will present the latest in research for Chili Trips.
- ! Bernadette Williams from the WI Department of Natural Resources will present the latest research on jumping worms.
- ! Dr. Lance Osborn is coming to speak on the latest research on Japanese Beetles

Jolene Adams will be moderating the hybridizing panel. The four speakers on the Hybridizer panel:

- ! Steven singer (WI)-Hybridizer 'Olivia Rose', 'Swingtime', and 'RBG'.
- ! Jim Sproul (CA)-Hybridized the two roses that have been selected as our convention gift, 'Diane Sommers' and 'Milwaukee Sunrise.' Both roses are miniature roses. Jim has also hybridized 'Heather Sproul', 'Alonza', 'Pink Brickhouse', and the entire econic series on the market.
- ! Dave Bank (CA)- is working a lot with MF. His roses are available at K&M Nursery (FL). 'Delightful', 'High Honey', and 'It's so Yummy.'
- ! Steven Roussell (LA) - focusses on large roses such as 'Clovie', 'Vibrate Bonnie', and 'Liz Charm.'

Where are the hybridizers headed, and what can we expect that is coming in the rose world?

We have excellent people speaking. We are hoping to have Gary Barlow assist with the Arrangement seminar, if not in person, by remote video.

There will be 16 different presenters, KLIMA award winners, and others. There will be education for everyone.

Rose Show

There will be many exciting Challenge Classes in the Rose Show. The Photography show is being judged on Friday evening. On Saturday, we will have the traditional horticulture and design rose show. There will be 18 National Horticulture Challenge Classes, 16 National Challenge Classes, and nine International Challenge Classes. We have more challenge classes than at any National Rose Show. So, there are lots of opportunities to participate. It is a chance to see roses from all over the country, many that you usually do not get to see. It is a wonderful chance for the public, as well as our members.

Community Gardener Registration

Community Gardener Registration is targeted toward the casual rose grower, a Master Gardener, Garden Club member, or Nursery or Landscape workers. A reduced registration price offers one day of educational programs focusing on things directly geared toward the home gardener. (Regular registrants can attend these events as well). Marily Williams will talk about basic rose care. Melinda Meyers, a well-known author, TV, and radio personality will speak on companion planting for roses. Finally, we will have Rebecca Koraytem, from David Austin Roses, presents a history lesson about this beautiful variety of roses. It is a celebration! 2021 is David Austin's 60th Anniversary of the 'Mary Rose' introduction. All of these programs are scheduled for Saturday morning.

After lunch on Saturday, there will be docent lead tours of the rose show, geared toward people who have never seen a rose show. We will take people around in small groups, explain the purpose, how people enter exhibits, peek into the prep room, explain how roses are judged, and introduce them to exhibiting roses. It is a chance to explain the judging process, see the roses, and understand what is going on. Community Gardeners can sit in on the pest panel as well on Saturday afternoon. Additionally, Community Gardeners are invited to attend the garden tours.

Garden Tours

On Sunday afternoons, we are going to Steven Singer's home. Steve started his roses business in his yard. His yard is packed with about 200 roses. We will see an example of excellent rose-growing practices. There is a box lunch provided. From Steve's, we are going to Carrie and Joe Berg's. Carrie is a current VP ARS candidate. The Bergs have a beautiful home and garden called Piper Grove Farms. It is spectacular. They grow roses of every class and type.

Monday afternoon is an exceptional treat. We are going to Will Radler's playground, where he hybridized the iconic roses 'Knock Out' and 'Rainbow Knockout.' Radler also hybridizes crabapples and Koi, so there are many exciting things to see. It is a beautiful garden and an education to visit.

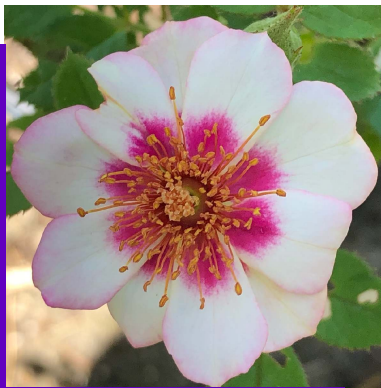
Critical Dates

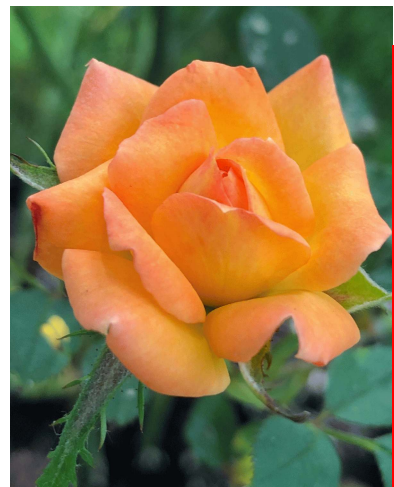
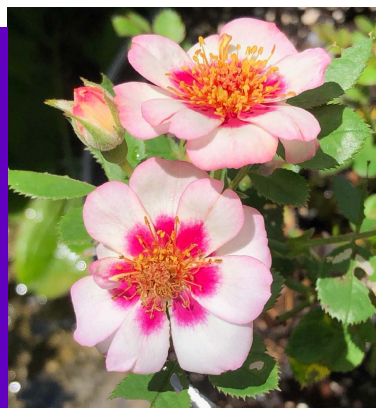
Cream City Roses Theme
